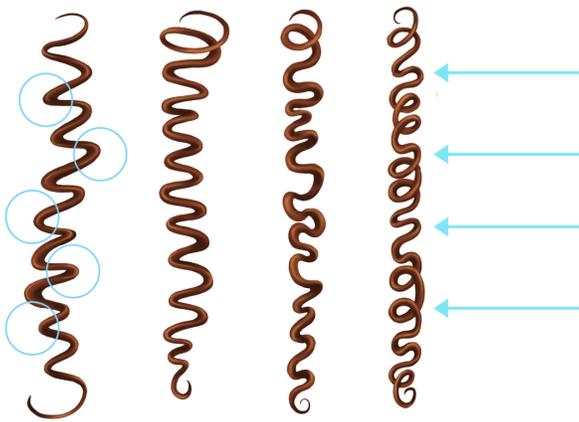




LENGTH RETENTION ROADMAP FOR AFRO TEXTURED HAIR

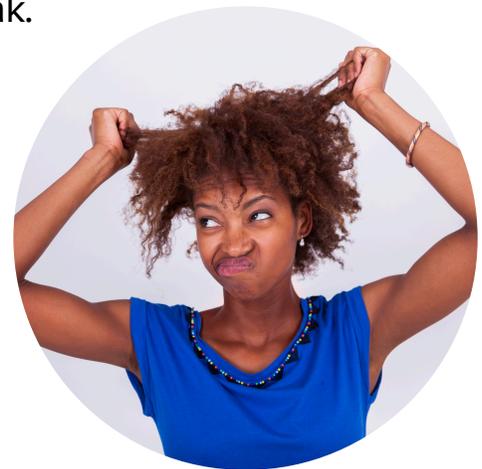
